On the third Sunday of Advent we particularly remember that Advent prepares us for a time of joy; with the colour rose acting as a symbol of the mix of the purple of penance and preparation joined with the

white of the expectation and joy of Christmas. Our Jesse Tree symbols this week have continued to remind us of the Old Testament stories of salvation in the history of God's people. On Monday, we had Jacob's ladder as a reminder that Heaven and Earth are united in God's care; then came a Ram's Horn to symbolise how Joshua brought down the walls of Jericho in response to God's call and the Pitcher used by Gideon to shelter the light that guided his people;. Next we had a Shepherd's Crook to remind us how David was to look after his people, but which also represents Jesus as the true Shepherd who seeks and cares for us always. On Thursday, we had Hezekiah's Tent to remind us of God's presence in difficult times through our union with the suffering and Sacrifice of Christ. Next we had the Ember and Tongs to represent how we too, like Isaiah, can be cleansed of our sins by the Lord and speak out his word to others; with the symbol of Jeremiah's Tears representing his grief at how God's people had sinned and needed to turn back to the Lord. At today's Family Mass we place Habakkuk's Watchtower to symbolise our watchfulness in waiting upon the day of the Lord's coming and at the 11am Mass, Nehemiah's Wall around Jerusalem symbolised God's holiness and protection. Sadly, we know the current war between Hamas and the people of Israel make the Holy Land and the Gaza strip places of grief and division, with the security wall around Jerusalem dividing the land. Let us to continue to pray for the innocent who suffer and the guilty who inflict suffering, so that people of peace will rise-up to bring an end to such dreadful violence.

Amen Our Jesse Tree symbols for the last Sunday of Advent begin with the first reference to the New Testament, with the Carpenter's Hammer representing Joseph's profession and his unique role in the story of our Λ Λ Λ Λ



salvation. The next symbol reminded us of how Elizabeth's husband, Zechariah, used a **Writing Tablet**, to proclaim the name of John the Baptist and his role in preparing a Way for the Lord. Scriptures over the next two days spoke to us of the **Motherhood** of Mary and her cousin Elizabeth, with a symbol of the **Commandments** pointing the way to Mary as the new **Ark of the Covenant**.



Commandments pointing the way to Mary as the new **Ark of the Covenant.** The **Scallop Shell** symbolises both John's baptism and our own Christian journey of pilgrimage as we await the Lord's return. Our next symbol was a **Crown** to represent the birth of Jesus as Christ and King of King in the line of David, God's anointed one. The Nativity is represented on our Jesse Tree by the **manger** that cradled the infant Jesus and the **White Candle**, symbolises Christ as Light of the World, shown in the white candle of our Advent wreath, lit at our first Mass of Christmas. Our final Jesse Tree symbol is the **Chi-Rho** monogram, a combination of the first two letters for the Greek word of Christos, Christ – the true Light that came into the world on the first Christmas Day. As each member of our Parish family draws

together with family and friends at Christmas, let us remember in prayer all those who find this a time of difficulty and hardship, especially those in areas of conflict and war such as the recent devistation in Israel and Palestine. With my prayers for all those in need and especially for you and all your loved ones, God bless, Fr Adrian

Catholic Primary School applications for 2024

If you're applying to a Catholic Primary School for next year, please see Fr Adrian, after Mass, to obtain a form called the "Parish Reference Request". This form gives details of what information the Parish needs (e.g. baptism details and copy certificate) plus any School forms for Fr Adrian to complete (i.e. the School "SIF"). These forms are to be handed to Fr Adrian at the end of the usual Sunday Mass you attend. Please remember that at least a week is needed to give time to process the forms, so that forms handed-in one Sunday, are usually returned the following week. Please see Fr Adrian if you have any guestions and please make sure that you are aware of each School's cut-off date.
