This week we introduce the series of scripture reflections to aid our journey towards and through Lent. The aim of this series is to help us get a sense of the Scriptures as a whole. To see the unfolding of God’s liberating and creative love in the history of Israel and in the Church. Each week we will take a fundamental core teaching of Scripture, for example, the revelation of the name of God in Exodus, and explore how God’s people began to look backward to understand their past, and forward to imagine their future life.

We will read of periods of loss and denial, of prophetic re-envisioning reminding the people of their unique call and their unique sense of God. **Each week we will take a significant passage of Scripture and explore its influence in the faith journey of God’s people.** We will consider the word of God in Scripture and its continuing power and influence in our own faith. Over the weeks, as we journey in scripture together towards Easter, **let us pray that we will grow** in our capacity **to respond** to God’s word, **to interpret** God’s word, and perhaps to have the courage **to be challenged** by God’s word in our lives.

Gone Phishing: Words of advice from a Parish Member who has experience in matters of internet security

During the pandemic, we are all relying more heavily than ever on the internet for work, entertainment, shopping, and general-life admin. Unfortunately, cyber criminals are taking advantage of this to scam people with phishing emails. These emails are designed to trick the recipient into sharing their personal details, sending money, or clicking on malware links. Phishing emails can look very convincing, so here are a few things you can do to help you identify if an email is legitimate.

Check the sender’s email address

This means checking not only the name of the sender, but the actual email address they have used. If the email address looks suspicious (e.g. it is full of random numbers and letters, or it contains a misspelling), then it probably is a scam. Equally, if the email claims to be from a reputable organisation but is from a public email domain (e.g. @gmail.com, @yahoo.co.uk, @hotmail.com) then it most likely comes from an individual, and not an organisation.

Check the tone and language

You can often tell that an email is a scam because it contains poor spelling and grammar. In a similar way, if an email purporting to be sent by someone you know does not sound like them at all, it is best to first ask your contact if they have sent you an email before clicking on any of the links in the email.

Be suspicious of any request for your personal details

Many scams are designed to steal people’s personal details or money. If an email asks for sensitive information from you, it is always safer to call the organisation first to ensure the email is legitimate.

Don’t be fooled by false urgency

Scammers will often try to create a sense of urgency to ensure the recipient engages with their email. For instance, the email might suggest an account you have will be closed, or an automatic payment will be made in your name unless you act immediately. This is a scare tactic. If you have any doubt, call the organisation first to check the email is legitimate.

If you receive an email you suspect to be a scam, you can forward it onto the government’s official Suspicious Email Reporting Service: report@phishing.gov.uk If you have any particular concerns, please email the Parish Office as your questions can be forwarded to our Parish ‘Web’ Volunteer.

At his General Audience on Wednesday, Pope Francis marked International Holocaust Remembrance Day and observed that:
